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# Colonel-in-Chief

### The Right Honourable

Adrienne Clarkson, PC, CC, CMM, COM, CD My Dear Patricias,

One year has passed and we are still watching the horror of what is happening in Ukraine. Usually the word "watching" is followed by the word "helplessly" but in this case I think is unwarranted. We are doing our part as much as we can while still keeping the peace to help Ukraine in her struggle against this terrible and unwarranted aggression. The war is dragging on but it shows the courage, resilience and heart of the Ukrainian people and I know that we are all hoping and praying that their determination and courage will see them through this. It is very difficult for Canadians to watch this and feel very helpless as we see the unjustified suffering of a nation of people who simply want their nationality and culture to be recognized.

And we seem to be less menaced by COVID-19 at this moment. However, we must always stay alert and on guard because these diseases have their own trajectories and we are not through this particular one yet. I think caution and precautions are still in order for all of us. We are fortunate to live in a country which has come



out the other side of this first phase of COVID with relatively fewer losses than many other developed nations. But we must keep our guard up and do what we can to keep further waves from submerging us. It is very difficult to read about aggression in a part of the world which is trying to fight back and to understand what it is that we, as Canadians, are doing to help. I am very heartened to know that what we are doing within the capacities that we have as the Canadian Armed Forces to help, is very meaningful and concrete.

Luckily for us, we are able to take actions and to actively help. I recently chatted with LCol Craig Higgins and his RSM CWO Eric Vollick who are now a part of the eFp Force in Latvia. They are part of our 250 PPCLI soldiers there and of the enhanced forward presence with elements from Albania, Montenegro, Italy, Macedonia among others. Canada is leading. It is a challenging posting for us but the stand against aggression is very real and urgent considering Ukraine is not that far away. The Latvians are very motivated having known what it was to be under Soviet domination. And there seems to be the feeling that Latvia and the Baltic States aren't standing alone anymore against aggression. Luckily for them they have not had their territory invaded but, in their minds, they are prepared for everything. The brave stance of the Ukrainian people has helped them to sustain their own morale.



I also had a chat with Major Jurgen Miranda, CO of the Canadian Training Team in the United Kingdom and his CSM MWO Martin Cook. They are part of the group that is ultimately responsible for training 10,000 troops a month for the Ukrainian Armed Forces. This is an astounding feat and one which I wish the Canadian public knew more about: that our troops are able to train the people who are actually going to fight aggression directly. It is a wonderful statement about our military training capacity and our enhanced commitment to prepare for aggression.

I was also able to talk to BGen Wade Rutland, the senior Canadian commander in the Middle East as the Commander Joint Task Force Impact in Kuwait. He emphasized to me the point of view from his geographic location that while Ukraine is absorbing a lot of our attention, we must not ignore the intense volatility and social unrest in Iran and the deep political dissension in Israel.

I was glad to talk to these three leaders in different parts of the world who are part of the active leadership of our Regiment. They gave me a point of view of which made me realize how important what we do abroad is. It is very targeted and essential activity and we must not forget that.

At home, we have had to do deal again with the accelerated consequences of climate change. As a Regiment we are called upon to help in environmental disasters. This is work that is necessary on our home front. But we must always work as citizens as well to try and alleviate the conditions that are leading to this accelerating ruin of our physical world. As the Armed Forces, we can help with the tragedies and upheaval that come from climate change but it is incumbent on all of us as Canadian citizens to be aware that we must do the utmost to make sure that climate change does not get any worse. It is the acceleration of the rate of change which is the most frightening for all of us.

While all this is happening around us, we must remember history and remember what we have sacrificed in the past to keep our countries free for democracy. If you haven't already done so, I recommend you watch "All Quiet on the Western Front", the German film about the World War I which so graphically and horrifyingly depicts the war in which we as Patricias first fought. It is good for us to remember by seeing films that are so wonderfully crafted as this one, what we are here for, what we are prepared to do and what our history has been.

I want to thank BGen Vince Kennedy for his wonderful years as Colonel of the Regiment. I have enjoyed working with him and found his support to be invaluable. And I welcome General Ray Romses who will become the new Colonel of the Regiment officially this summer. Ray and Carol have been a constant presence in the Regiment and I look forward to seeing more of them in the near future.

I wish you all the best as we approach our 110th anniversary. We will always be "first in the field".

# **Colonel of the Regiment (Former)**

### **Brigadier-General**

V.W. Kennedy, OMM, MSM, CD (Retired)

This annual journal captures the evolving history of the PPCLI and highlights the regimental activities and accomplishments of the past year. 2022 has, like its predecessor, been a completely unusual year, with the Regiment persevering through the last stages of the global pandemic. In unison, the slow burning Russo-Ukranian war burst into flames in February with the invasion of Ukraine and has continued all year. The Putin Effect – essentially an unbelievable series of strategic decisions by one man producing high anxiety and difficult choices – came to dominate, almost in an instant, our lives. The next round of operational deployments to the likes of Latvia, Ukraine, the Middle East and UK in 2022, took a massive effort.

2022 has been remarkable for the undoing of global stability, not only from the Russian war against Ukraine but also to a deterioration of relationships between China and North Korea (with 50 missile launches) and the proximate neighbours in that region. Political unrest has also been a scourge which has contributed to a broader sense of unease. All of these things have continued to cause a distraction of focus from the security implications of climate change. Food and water scarcity are in the headlines every week.

Despite all the challenges, I am always impressed with our soldiers and their leaders. I have been able for part of the year to travel to see the Battalions. I visited 1 and 3 PPCLI in Edmonton last spring, joined the Ottawa Branch for March 17th lunch, joined in the Kingston Branch Golf Day in the summer, unveiled the Pitts Plaque at RMC on behalf of the family in September, was at the re-dedication of the Ottawa Window in October, and had a small hand in the addition of a Wreath of Laurel to the Regimental Colour laid up in Beechwood, Ottawa. The Ottawa Branch Beechwood Remembrance Day Service got out a full house with the Colonel-in-Chief and her husband, and family groups of five of the Lost, attending. Everywhere that I roamed this year as before, the interest I see on our soldiers' and veterans' faces assures me that the core spirit of this Regiment, founded to fight and remembered for its perserverance, has not changed.




# Regimental Leadership



### Brigadier-General V.W. Kennedy, OMM, MSM, CD (Retired)

### Former Colonel of the Regiment

Formerly serving as Colonel of the Regiment, Brigadier-General (Retired) Kennedy has served as a subaltern with 3 Mechanized Commando, a Company Commander with the 3<sup>rd</sup> Battalion Royal Green Jackets and with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, PPCLI. He went on to command the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion PPCLI, and later became the Chief of Staff of the 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Division HQ as well as Army Headquarters. As Colonel of the Regiment, Brigadier-General (Retired) Kennedy is responsible for fostering Regimental *esprit de corps*, liaising with outside units and agencies on behalf of the regiment, and offering sage advice and guidance on regimental affairs.



General Wayne Eyre, CMM, MSC, CD

### Senior Serving Patricia

Upon commissioning in 1988 he joined the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, PPCLI, and has had the great privilege of spending the majority of his career in command or deputy command positions, including commanding 3rd Battalion PPCLI, 2nd Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group, 3rd Canadian Division and Joint Task Force West, Deputy Commanding General – Operations for XVIII (US) Airborne Corps, Deputy Commander Military Personnel Command, Deputy Commander United Nations Command in Korea, and for a short time Commander of Military Personnel Command. He became Commander Canadian Army on 20 August 2019. As the Senior Serving Patricia, General Eyre was appointed CDS on the 25th november 2021 after acting in the role for 9 months.





Major-General M.C. Wright, MMV, MSM, CD

### President of the Guard

Born and raised in Southern Ontario, Major-General Wright enrolled in the Canadian Armed Forces in 1990 and joined Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI) in 1994. He has served in all three Canadian Mechanized Brigade Groups and deployed on operations with all three Regular Force infantry regiments. He spent 11 years with 2 PPCLI in Winnipeg and Shilo, commanding at the platoon, company and battalion level. He also served three years with the Second Battalion of the Royal 22e Regiment. He commanded 2 CMBG from 2017-2018. He was appointed Commander CFINTCOM and Chief of Defence Intelligence in June 2021. Major-General Wright has served as the President of the PPCLI Guard since summer 2022.

Upon completion of Basic Infantry Officer training, he was posted to 3rd Battalion, PPCLI. Since then, he has served with all three Battalions in a wide variety of command and staff positions. 
# Regimental Leadership

### Vice President of the Guard Regimental Colonel

Colonel L'Heureux enrolled in the Canadian Armed Forces in 1997. ### Vice President of the Guard (Strategy)

Colonel Jurkowski is currently the Chief of Staff for the Canadian Defence Academy. Col Jurkowski has served with the regiment in Bosnia, twice in Afghanistan, and with the 3rd Army as it transitioned to the Combined Joint Task Force Operation Inherent Resolve as their Deputy J5. Col Jurkowski has commanded the 5th Canadian Division Training Centre and has served with the Joint Staff under the DCDS Group, as an Executive Assistant to Comd 3rd Canadian Division and to Joint Task Force Command Brunssum's J5, as the Deputy Chief of Staff Army Training Authority, as the J3 at the 1st Canadian Division, and most recently as the Director of Programmes at the Canadian Forces College. As the Regimental Guard Vice President (Strategy), he is responsible for coordinating and managing the Regimental Strategy.





### Chief Warrant Officer Michael Patrick Forest, MMM, MSM, CD

### **Regimental Chief Warrant Officer**

Chief Warrant Officer Michael Patrick Forest enrolled in the Canadian Armed Forces on 14 June, 1990 as an Infantry Soldier with PPCLI in Sherbrooke, QC. After completion of basic infantry training, he was posted to 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion PPCLI at Kapyong Barracks in Winnipeg, MB. Since then, he has deployed to Croatia, Bosnia twice, Afghanistan and Latvia. On 12 May 2017, he was appointed as the Regimental Sergeant Major of 1 PPCLI until 22 September 2018, when he came back from Latvia, CWO Forest was appointed as the Sergeant Major of 2 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group. He is currently the Sergeant Major of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Canadian Division and Joint Task Force East. In his capacity as Regimental Chief Warrant Officier, he sits as a member of both the Regimental Executive Committee and the Guard. In addition, he provides on career matters to the Regimental Colonel.



### Lieutenant-Colonel Craig Higgins, CD

### Chair of the Regimental Executive Committee

Lieutenant-Colonel Higgins is the Commanding Officer of the 1st Battalion PPCLI. He started his career at 2nd Battalion PPCLI in Winnipeg as a Platoon Commander. In 2006 he successfully tried out for Special Forces selection at the Canadian Special Operations Regiment (CSOR) upon the standup of that unit. After completing his Special Forces Course he served as CSOR's first Platoon Commander and helped lead its first operational deployment in 2006. Since then, he has completed four tours in Afghanistan, one tour in Libya, one tour in Iraq, as well as numerous smaller domestic missions in Canada. He also returned to CSOR as the Deputy Commanding Officer from 2015-2017. Prior to his current position, he served at the Strategic Joint Staff as the Deputy Director Current Operations.

Mr. Ted Giraldeau, CD President of the PPCLI Association

Ted Giraldeau began his military career in 1976 as a reservist with the GGFG. He transferred to the Regular Force in 1979 and attended Royal Roads Military College. Upon graduation and commissioning, he was posted to 3rd Battalion, where he served as a rifle platoon commander and as 2IC and OC Mortar Platoon. Following a French course and a 2-year stint at FMC HQ, Ted returned to Regimental duty in Calgary in 1989, just in time to celebrate the Regiment's 75th Anniversary. He was seconded for a year to Brigade HQ as G1, then served as Rear Party Adjutant during a Cyprus tour, and later as Training Officer. In 1992, Ted was posted to the Army Staff College in Kingston and then returned to 3rd Battalion as Adjutant when it stood up again in Edmonton in 1996. He was promoted that year and assumed command of the Para Company. Following a NATO mission to Macedonia and later into Kosovo, Ted was posted as the Commanding Officer of Land Forces Western Area HQ. After his two years of command, Ted was posted to RHQ as the Regimental Major. He served in this self-described "penultimate Regimental duty" for almost six years until his retirement from the CF in December 2006. For the next 11 years, Ted continued his public service through appointments to the Veterans Review and Appeal Board and the Appeals Commission for Alberta's Workers Compensation. He also served a term as the Association's Edmonton Branch secretary leading up to the 100th Anniversary from 2012-14. He is currently fully retired and residing on Vancouver Island.





Mr. Dave Pentney, CD President of the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund

Mr. Pentney joined the Regiment following graduation from the Royal Military College in 1976. His Regimental service included two postings with the 1st Battalion in Calgary; a posting with the 2nd Battalion in Germany; and two posting with 2 Airborne Commando, the Canadian Airborne Regiment. As Chair of the Regiment Executive Committee in the early 1990s he gained a strong appreciation of the PPCLI Association's contribution to the larger Regimental family. While still serving, he was instrumental in the creation of the Kingston Branch of the Association. Following retirement from the CF in 2004 he has been active with the Association serving as Branch President, National Vice-President. He was the National President during the 100th Anniversary. He was elected s the Chair of the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund in May 2021.



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# 1 PPCLI Alpha Company

Throughout much of 2020 and 2021, COVID-19 prevented the Battalion from conducting the required courses to upkeep our vehicle operator qualifications. Aggravating the already less-than-stellar manning situation was an Op LENTUS deployment in summer of 2021, which pulled away further resources and personnel from the Battalion. To further complicate things, in the middle of the COVID-19 Pandemic, 1 PPCLI was forced to shift its Main Effort away from collective training, instead devoting the former half of 2022 to Force Generate the required personnel for Op REASSURANCE 23-01. Despite a frenzied period in Canada and globally, and to the credit of 1 PPCLI overall, the Battalion still found time to deploy to Wainwright, for Ex PATRICIA SPEAR from 5 to 11 March 2022.

This exercise saw companies operating independently from one another, with two main objectives; The first, to have as many personnel as possible attain their Cold Weather Operator qualification, and the second, to validate dismounted, section-level live-fire manoeuvre. In a typical Alberta winter fashion, Mother Nature provided ideal conditions to practice winter warfare skills, with temperatures often reaching -30 degrees Celsius, and snow squalls regularly battering the troops day and night. Despite a plethora of uncomfortably frigid conditions, the First Battalion pressed on, paying little heed to their discomforts.

Developing plans that were progressive in nature, companies first focused on their cold weather operator skills. Setting up 10-man tents, keeping a Coleman propane stove running, or packing and unpacking sleds, while occasionally rage-inducing, are all essential skills which must be learned and practiced in order to survive, or even thrive, in such extreme environments. Shifting focus from surviving in the elements to fighting in them, the companies then gradually incorporated more complexity in the form of tactical activities. The culminating activities for the rifle companies saw a variety of live-fire, dismounted section ranges. Breaking up the necessary order and familiarity of the range shoots, soldiers were also sent out to conduct night patrols, adapting to the harsh reality of little foliage in the winter with which to remain unseen. Though at times cold and miserable, the Battalion proved that it will show resolve and succeed in no matter what the environment or conditions.

Admin Company's support duties were (surpsingly!) light relative to a standard 1 PPCLI mechanized exercise, so they maximized their newfound opportunity to focus on low-level tactics, often moving outside of their comfort zone of what would normally be asked of the rear echelons. Their live fire ranges culminated with timing 30 of the Bn's long-awaited new C6 Flex - General Purpose Machine Guns.

Ex PATRICIA SPEAR was designed with simplicity at its core to allow all levels of leadership to focus on the basics under challenging conditions before the Battalion shifted its focus to Op REASSURANCE 23-01 preparations.

# **Charlie Company**

Between April and August 2022, 1 PPCLI maintained operations at a high level, transitioning to the spring and summer training cycles. The Battalion externally supported the Lead Mounting Units (LMU) of both Op IMPACT and Op REASSURANCE. Internally, the Battalion conducted several Primary Combat Function (PCF) courses, and the Companies (Coy) ran substantial low-level training to build and sustain soldier skills. With the Battalion poised to deploy to Latvia in December with Op REASSURANCE as the LMU, the training focus early in the year was validating the deploying personnel to confirm their operational readiness. This time of the year explicitly stressed low level training events, which were to culminate in higher level exercises later in the year.

In April and May, 1 PPCLI supported the LMU of Op IMPACT Roto 7, the Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians) (LdSH [RC]), by deploying several personnel across the Middle East region. 1 PPCLI personnel were sent on six-month deployments to Kuwait, Jordan, and Lebanon. Op IMPACT's mission is to build military capabilities in the region, and set the conditions for long-term success and stability. The soldiers of 1 PPCLI contributed to the mission by offering combat arms training and expertise to the host nations. In June, 1 PPCLI supported Op REASSURANCE by deploying several personnel to fill key positions in Latvia, Poland, and Romania. The main effort of Op REASSURANCE is to reinforce NATO's collective defence by showing solidarity and strength in Eastern Europe. Multiple 1 PPCLI soldiers were deployed to Latvia for a period of six months to support this effort.

This PCF cycle conducted in Edmonton and surrounding areas such as included a litany of courses: Basic Machine Gunning, Basic Reconnaissance Patroller, Driver Wheel, Dismounted and Mounted Communications, and Direct Fire Support in Gunnery. In May, the training cycle continued, with courses run on the Tube-Launched Optically-Tracked, Wire-Guided (TOW) Missile systems, Light Armoured Vehicle (LAV) Gunner and Crew Commander, and Forklift Operator. In June, the Battalion ran courses on LAV Driver, the Automatic Grenade Launcher System (AGLS), and Medium Support Vehicle Systems (MSVS).

July consisted of courses on Bison Armoured Vehicle Driving, and further serials for LAV Driver/

Crew Commander and AGLS courses. These PCFs are vital for the operational readiness of 1 PPCLI, due in no small part to the constant influx of new troops moving in and out of the unit. For several members of the Battalion, this was their first course since being posted to 1 PPCLI. The cycle imbues new soldiers with much-needed skills, such as driving a LAV, and allows experienced soldiers to learn specialty skills and take on new roles, such as the LAV Gunner and Crew Commander courses.

Beyond the annual training cycle, the Coys conducted a variety of low-level training throughout the spring and early summer to build cohesion and work towards culminating exercises. Between April and July, C Coy conducted Ex GRIZZLY WRANGLER, a series of training events that culminated in a platoon-level, force-on-force, 'Simmu-Nition' attack at the Advanced Urban Ops Centre in Edmonton. In June, A Coy joined C Coy for a day-long navigation event in Red Water, AB, to sharpen their basic navigational skills in adverse terrain. Further low-level training events included: 9mm and Shotgun ranges, where doors were created by the Pioneer cell to practice breaching; All Arms Call For Fire simulation, granting newer troops exposure to combined-arms tactics; and simulating section-level Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for complex challenges, on the Edmonton Simulation Range. Training for 1 PPCLI remains well-rounded to perpetuate its proud history of proficiency and excellence.

With the central focus of the Battalion in 2022 being trained on the upcoming deployment to Latvia in December, the time between April and August necessitated operational preparation. 1 PPCLI balanced the administrative attention required for deploying personnel to several nations in Europe and the Middle East, with the high tempo training requirements of a unit set to deploy in the same year.

# **Combat Support Company**

The majority of August 2022 saw the First Battalion on summer leave. For some soldiers, an extended leave was granted after being identified for future deployments. In hindsight, this was surely the "lull in the battle", as the following months would turn out to be some of the busiest in recent memory.

Immediately off summer leave, key leadership participated in an abbreviated Pre-Deployment Training (PDT), in preparation for a flight to Latvia for the enhanced Forward Presence Battle Group (eFP BG) Latvia (LVA) Rotation 23-01 Tactical Reconnaissance (Tac Recce) and Leadership Development Program (LDP). This trip, spanning two weeks, gave leaders valuable insight into the challenges that were to come in the Battalion's deployment to the region as the lead for eFP BG LVA, in the first half of 2023.

At the time of the Tac Recce, the force in place was Second Battalion PPCLI, who – by September – were working up to their final BG-level exercise: Ex RAMPART FORGE. For the audience attending the Tac Recce, this was an opportunity to witness the BG after they had polished and refined their soldiering skills in preparation for their major exercise with the LVA Mechanized Infantry Brigade (MI Bde).

The tail-end of the trip was followed by a second wave of First Battalion Patricias flying into Latvia to augment the International Capstone Exercise (ICE) run by the Canadian Manoeuvre Training Centre (CMTC). This ICE saw 1 PPCLI Observer-Controller Trainers (OCTs) help evaluate the 2 PPCLI-led BG while they were validating during the Combined Readiness Evaluation (CREVAL) on the MI Bde's Exercise, SILVER ARROW.

Parallel to the Tac Recce, the 1 PPCLI BG - Task Force WOLVERINES - stood up in early September in Edmonton, combining soldiers from over a dozen units from across the third Canadian Division. The goal was ambitious: to integrate and train hundreds of soldiers (many of whom had just met each other) in just six short weeks to begin collective training on Ex PATRICIA WOLVERINES (Ex PW). While key leadership was still in Latvia, soldiers were conducting Individual Battle Task Standards (IBTS) training and refining their individual soldier skills. This included driving courses for primary combat functions, first aid, simulator weapons training, and a host of online courses.

Meanwhile, as the Battalion's readiness was steadily increasing, the BG leadership returned in time for Ex VIGILANT RAM, First Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group's (1 CMBG) annual Computer-Assisted Exercise (CAX). The Exercise represented not only, cost-effective means for 1 CMBG to challenge its senior leadership in a virtual environment, but also a challenge for the signalers to prepare. Working through all the challenges posed throughout the CAX, 1 PPCLI was successfully validated at Level 6.

There was little time for a break, but the Battalion pulled through in their preparation and was ready to kick off Ex PW, the last major hurdle before the newly-established BG flew to their designated Theatre of Operations.

### **Bravo Company**

Bravo Company, 1 PPCLI, was designated as the Mechanized Infantry Company for the enhanced Forward Presence Battle Group (eFP BG) Latvia 23-01. To prepare, Bravo Company participated in 1 PPCLI's Ex PATRICIA WOLVERINE, from 13 October to 6 November 2022. The Exercise assessed all levels of basic soldier skills, from individual weapons and battle task standards up to Company-level live-fire from both defensive and offensive postures.

All soldiers of First Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group (1 CMBG) can expect to face harsh weather during any exercise in Wainwright, especially over the late fall and winter months. However, the first few weeks were unseasonably warm and dry. Taking full advantage of the weather, Bravo Company conducted ranges for pistols, rifles, machine guns, grenades, M203 grenade launchers, Automatic Grenade Launcher Systems (AGLS), and the Tube-Launched, Optically-Tracked, Wirelessly-Guided (TOW) Missile system. Additionally, all the Light Armoured Vehicle (LAV) crews participated in a gun camp that began with grouping and zeroing their cannons and coaxial machine guns, and culminated in live fire Battle Runs. Range fires, ignited by tracer ammunition, were a common occurrence stemming from unseasonably warm and dry conditions. Seizing the opportunity to add additional realism, Bravo Company pressed their attacks through the flames whenever it was reasonably safe to do so.

The section attack is one of the most critical building blocks for higher levels of operations. Good attacks at the Section level, make good Platoon attacks, which in turn make good Company attacks, and so on. As such, time spent honing skills at the Section level pays dividends further down the line at all levels. To prepare for live-fire section attacks, Bravo Company soldiers progressively improved their skills by practicing pairs-level fire and movement, by both day and night, before coming together in mounted Sections which combined the full strength of the Infantry Section with the firepower of the LAV.

Next, Bravo Company conducted platoon attacks on a range controlled by Charlie Company. The platoons were enhanced by a section of Engineers from First Combat Engineer Regiment (1 CER), and were supported by indirect fires from First Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery (1 RCHA). The platoons were required to navigate to an attack position, employ Engineers to mechanically breach wire obstacles, and then attack the enemy. First, by using their LAVs to deliver devastating direct fires while on the move, and then by dismounting to ensure every enemy position was defeated. Zulu LAVs punched out to establish security, and were presented with a new threat in-depth, that required an All Arms Call for Fire to get indirect fire support from 1 RCHA to neutralize the enemy. During each platoon attack, Bravo Company soldiers used all the skills practiced during section attacks, plus incorporated the platoon weapons teams which brought in extra firepower from the 84mm Carl Gustav Recoilless Rifles.

The final portion of the exercise was a Level 5 Live-Fire Range, which would occur over a four-day period and would include both defensive and offensive operations. Bravo Company achieved Level 5 status, with support provided by a Field Troop from 1 CER, a Forward Observation (FO) Team from 1 RCHA, and Close Air Support (CAS) controlled by a Joint Terminal Air Controller (JTAC). The first phase of the plan involved occupying a Company-sized defensive position on Bone Pile Butte and Chap Hill. Naturally, as soon as we transitioned to defensive operations the beautiful weather changed to frigid temperatures, howling winds, and heavy snowfall. Luckily, the Heavy Equipment Troop from 1 CER provided survivability support by digging vehicle run-ups and trenches, so the soldiers of Bravo Company were able to quickly create fully fortified positions with overhead protection.

While Bravo Company continued to develop and improve their defensive position, Reconnaissance Platoon and Snipers from Combat Support Company conducted a screen which established contact with the enemy and provided information about his advance. When it was time for Combat Support Company to hand over the battle to Bravo Company, a Rearward Passage of Lines was conducted. The Field Troop from 1 CER sealed the lanes with an explosive crater group, and from there Bravo Company was ready to face the oncoming threat.

Once enemy targets entered into Bravo Company's Kill Zone, the main defensive battle commenced. Using CAS and indirect fires to destroy targets at long range, Bravo Company stripped away the enemy's advance elements and combat recce patrols. As the enemy inched closer, they were destroyed by Bravo Company's LAVs and crew-served weapons systems. When the enemy made one final surge, the Counter-moves force was called forward to provide reinforcement, and subsequently helped block the enemy's advance.

Once the main defensive battle was over, Bravo Company withdrew from the position and regrouped in order to conduct a Company-level counterattack against an enemy target that appeared to be assembling for further operations. The enemy was a Platoon-sized element, with several Armoured Personnel Carriers, and protected by wire obstacles. Furthermore, the enemy had been reinforced with three tanks. Using CAS strikes and TOW missiles to destroy the tanks and soften enemy defenses, then calling up the Field Troop to explosively breach the obstacles, Bravo Company manoeuvred to, and destroyed, the enemy objective.

Ex PATRICIA WOLVERINE concluded with Bravo Company being validated as the next Mechanized Infantry Company which will be deployed to Latvia as part of eFP BG 23-01, in order to help NATO in their efforts to deter further Russian aggression.

After Ex PATRICIA WOLVERINE, 1 PPCLI's rear-party was instrumental in helping the deploying soldiers finalize all of the last-minute administrative requirements. Then, all soldiers took approximately two weeks of leave before boarding flights bound overseas to Latvia.

Lastly, as has become tradition for each company deploying on Op REASSURANCE, the company involved will get to pick their own Call Sign. For this mission, Bravo Company soldiers anointed themselves Call SignBANDIT.

# 2 PPCLI Alpha Company

Following a busy and successful 2021, Alpha Company (A Coy) quickly began to focus efforts to prepare for a summer deployment to Latvia on Operation REASSURANCE Rotation 22-02. Forming the foundation of the Canadian Mechanized Infantry Company as part of the enhanced Forward Presence (eFP) Latvia, A Coy received soldiers and leaders from the other sub-units within 2 PPCLI to increase manning strength prior to the start of Pre-Deployment Training (PDT).

Training commenced in January with Exercise (Ex) FRIGID KAPYONG 2022 where the focus was at dismounted section and platoon-level winter operations. In addition to confirming the company's ability to fight in all weather conditions, this exercise became the forging activity for the company's new order of battle (ORBAT) that would eventually be further augmented and deploy in June. Increasing qualifications and developing depth in capabilities was also a large effort as Primary Combat Function (PCF) 22-01 filled the schedule between Ex FRIGID KAPYONG and the start of PDT.

In early April, 2 PPCLI stood up as the next eFP Battle Group, and final attachments from reserve units, 1 PPCLI, 1 CER, 1 Svc Bn, and 1 RCHA fell in on the A Coy ORBAT – now known as LONGHORN. Training started in mid-April with Ex KAPYONG RAMPART, the unit-led training event at CFB Shilo, which would see LONGHORN validated up to Level 5 Live by Commander 1 CMBG. Battling unusually severe weather conditions for the time-of-year, specifically two "storms of the century," the soldiers of LONGHORN proved their mettle as they completed all dry and live gateway training requirements. Shortly after receiving validation, lead elements of LONGHORN began their deployment to theatre.

On 15 June 2022, LONGHORN officially assumed the operational responsibilities of the Canadian Mechanized Infantry Company within eFP Latvia, with the eFB Battle Group's Transfer of Command Authority. Less than two weeks later, LONGHORN was in the Adazi Training Area on Ex THUNDER RAVEN conducting force-onforce training against VIDAR Coy (CV90 Company) of the Danish 1st Battalion, Guard Hussar Regiment. The next six months would see numerous training events with soldiers or elements from all the nations within eFP Latvia. Regular small arms ranges were run to allow soldiers to familiar themselves on the personal weapons used by other nations, while collective training events, such as Ex BURNING SANDS, saw LONGHORN operating with Italian tank and recce platoons.

In preparation for Rotation 22-02's culminating training events, LONGHORN saw the detachment of 1 Platoon to the Polish tank company, WARBOARS, and the attachment of a Polish tank platoon to the company. This grouping provided the eFP Battle Group a Canadian Infantry Combat Team and a Polish Armoured Combat Team that through the multiple Battle Group exercises developed strong cohesion, interoperability, and effectiveness.

The developed skills, drills, and capabilities were put to test during the Latvian Mechanized Infantry Brigade's annual training event, Ex SILVER ARROW, where the entire brigade (along with additional attachments) deployed in the Adazi Training Area for a week of force-on-force training. While the exercise was geared to support the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) Combat Readiness Evaluation (CREVAL), the incorporation of both scripted and non-scripted enemy play, tested and stressed command, control, as well as individual soldier's skills continuously. 2 Platoon saw the majority of their elements rolled into an ad hoc Direct Fire Support (DFS) Platoon employing both TOW and C16 automatic grenade launchers supporting the frontage of the eFP Battle Group's Engagement Area. 3 Platoon, held firm as the Battle Group's hard left shoulder, tying into the Italian defensive position on their flank. 1 Platoon, being the infantry platoon within WARBOARS, reacted to enemy actions within the Battle Groups rear, as well as formed the "boots-on-the-ground" for the countermoves force during the main defensive battle.

Following a successful CREVAL, LONGHORN transitioned to focusing on enhancing interoperability with Latvian and other NATO forces, while ensuring their "bayonets" remained sharp through ranges, force-on-force simunition events, and challenging experiences such as the DANCON March, Ex BALTIC WARRIOR and Ex LONGHORN STING. Having had a successful deployment, LONGHORN redeployed to Canada in time for the holiday season and to prepare for the events of 2023.

Throughout the duration of Rotation 22-02's deployment, soldiers of the A Coy Rear Party not only contributed to various tasks and assignments to them by the battalion, but took an active role in providing regimental support and care to the families of the deployed soldiers by forming the 2 PPCLI Family Support Cell.



### **Bravo Company**

Bravo "Pale Horse" Company (Coy) took off running in the New Year, diving right into Exercise (Ex) FRIGID KAPYONG 2022 (FK 22), the annual Battalion winter training exercise. Every year it serves as an excellent opportunity for our newest members to experience what the cold season in Manitoba is all about, while honing winter warfare and survival skills. During this exercise the Coy practiced constructing improvised shelters, austere fire-starting techniques, and patrolling at the section and platoon levels, culminating in the conduct of a platoon dry raid, followed by a section level 10-man tent setup race the following day.









Bridging the gap between exercises following Ex FK 22, B Coy was involved in running and participating on a number of Primary Combat Function (PCF)courses, broadening soldier skill sets while addressing deltas in coy competencies. During this cycle B Coy was tasked with running a Light Armoured Vehicle 6.0 Turret Operator and Crew Commander course. This course was particularly important as it bolstered 2PPCLI's ability to ensure unit success on Ex KAPYONG RAMPART 2022 (KR22), which contained all the necessary pre-deployment training for Alpha Coy to be declared operationally ready to deploy on Op REASSURANCE rotation 22-01 to Latvia. Spearheaded by B Coy for planning and execution, Ex KR 22 served as an opportunity for the majority of 2 PPCLI to achieve section live dismounted, while also supporting A Coy's validation by achieving combat team live. During the ex, B Coy dispersed and filled roles ranging from Officer-In-Command and Dismounted Range Safety Officer at the headquarters level, to safety staff and range supporting roles for the remainder, including drivers, target operators and sentries. Notably, the level 3 validation range consisted of a dismounted defensive position which made use of SIT pop-up targets simulating an advancing enemy force, followed by a mechanized counterattack onto the enemy's echelon by a mechanized platoon. The Coy Live was an equally complex attack, involving combined arms manoeuvre and exercise control supported by 11 Field Squadron from 1 Combat Engineer Regiment, a Forward Observation Officer from 1 Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, and the incorporation of live LAV overhead fire utilizing the vehicle's primary weapon system; the first time 25mm overhead has been conducted in training in Canada.

Moving into the summer months, B Coy began to take advantage of the hot dry summer by conducting individual soldier training. The focus of Ex HADES SCYTHE was to build confidence in the individual soldiers' marksmanship and abilities to make use of alternate and improvised firing positions to best utilize micro-terrain features and barriers for cover. This two week exercise saw the troops conducting indoor urban operations ranges, movement to and use of barricades for shooting, and involved many repetitions to build the right habits when under stress.

Upon return from summer leave the Coy Headquarters, supported by Battalion Operations, coordinated and confirmed the last of the necessary approvals for PPCLI's summer expedition training. This exercise, Ex KA-PYONG ARTEMIS (Ex KA), was a B Coy planned training exercise aimed at building cohesion and improving morale, while conducting expeditionary training outside of the normal 2 PPCLI area of operation. Ex KA was a week-long exercise conducted in Minaki, Ontario conducted in two waves. It involved daily stand training consisting of mountain operations training, austere camping, survival skills, and watermanship training. Outside of the training hours the members of 2 PPCLI were able to practice canoeing, fishing and fire building in a relatively relaxed environment. This exercise was made possible by a long-standing supporter of the Canadian Armed Forces and the Second Battalion in particular, Mr. Chuck Schaeffer from Cygnet Lake Camp.







Following a well-orchestrated summer training event, B Coy took part in Ex KAPYONG SPADE 22. This year the exercise included LAV crew refresher training, Platoon dry mechanized training, dismounted patrolling at the section and platoon level, and finished with section and platoon live dismounted training. The undulating Shilo terrain selected added complexity to the training both live and dry, solidifying the knowledge, movement and soldier skills at the individual level, while also testing the command, control and leadership of the section and platoon leadership. Ultimately this exercise resulted in the validation of B Coy's platoon leadership, and offered an opportunity for the sub-unit, unit and brigade leadership to observe the results of the soldiers' training.

Looking forward to the next bound, B Coy is poised for deployment on Op UNIFIER in the first quarter of 2023 under Major J. Miranda and Master Warrant Officer M. Cook. Preparation time for this tour was tight, as the task was received in late October, the TAC Recce conducted in mid November, and the PDT conducted in January, just prior to deploying in early February 2023. Concurrently, a small contingent of soldiers from B Coy deployed to Lebanon under the Op IMPACT Winter Mobility Training Team, at the end of the calendar year under Lieutenant T. Boulter and MWO J. Adair. 2023 is shaping up to be an exciting year for Pale Horse as 2 PPCLI rotates through the Canadian Army Managed Readiness Plan from the Committed phase, back into the Build phase, ramping back up for future Canadian Armed Forces priorities in the coming years.

### **Charlie Company**

The tempo in 2022 did not let up for Charlie Company (C Coy), despite having a third of the Bn deployed. The year saw multiple exercises and two Primary Combat Function (PCF) cycles, while continuously swapping personnel due to deployments and taskings. The Cowboys were flexible, and continued to train on multiple skill sets, both dismounted and mounted.

The year commenced with Ex FRIGID KAPYONG, where C Coy confirmed their winter warfare capabilities by conducting multiple fighting patrols, including an ambush and inter-section competitions on winter warfare tactics. Upon completing Ex FRIGID KAPYONG, C Coy soldiers completed various PCF courses. Notably, C Coy ran an IBMG and a CQC-B course, IOT increase the employability of the soldiers of 2PPCLI.

Following spring break, C Coy honed their mechanized, dismounted and urban fighting capabilities during Ex KAPYONG RAMPART. C Coy, supported by an MUAS detachment from 1 RCHA, trained on counter ambush drills with the LAV 6.0. This was an excellent way for the Gunners and C Company to test their skills and work together to define and eliminate threats. C Coy then built upon these skills, and conducted platoon level raids and ambushes. Ex KAPYONG RAMPART finished with urban warfare training including, an urban live fire shooting package.







C Coy transitioned to PCF courses running a LAV 6.0 driver and another CQC-B course. Once the LAV drivers got comfortable with the vehicles, C Coy completed two weeks of low-level training prior to getting a well-deserved rest over summer break. These weeks included the conduct of a long-range fighting patrol, platoon level mechanized training, marksmanship shooting and shooting competitions.

Well rested from the break, and building off of the low-level training, C Coy commenced the post summer leave block with IBTS ranges. These ranges built-up to a jungle lane shoot in pairs by day and night. In late August, C Coy deployed to Minaki, Ontario for Ex KAPYONG ARTEMIS. The exercise was an opportunity for the Coy to participate in some challenging expedition training to broaden their austere environment skills. C Coy enjoyed this training in Minaki with countless hours of fishing, rock climbing, navigation, rappelling, canoeing, and a few relaxed evenings.

With C Coy's morale at an all-time high after adventure training in Minaki, they started preparing for their next exercise, Ex KAPYONG SPADE. C Coy conducted a reorganization to consolidate the whole company into a platoon to facilitate the upcoming exercise. The preparation for the exercise started off with low level training where soldiers worked on their skills such as: navigation by day and by night, section attacks through easy and adverse terrain. They worked on point and route recces, and different methods to establish patrol bases. This led up to C Coy completing dry section and platoon level mechanized attacks within a combat team context.





With the mechanized attacks complete, C Coy transitioned to the dismounted portion of Ex KAPYONG SPADE. During this phase of the exercise, C Coy conducted a patrolling school, where the soldiers patrolled with loaded rucks over challenging long distances. C Coy practiced patrolling at the platoon level in a full tactical scenario where the steps of battle procedure was emphasized. Ex KAPYONG SPADE concluded with section and platoon live-fire dismounted attacks. In early November, C Coy supported several solemn tasks surrounding Remembrance Day across the Westman Region.

The next step for C Coy was Ex URBAN COWBOY. The exercise started off with basic gunfighter skills and then quickly transitioned to live-fire ranges over five days. During this time, soldiers had the opportunity to practice basic skills, fire and movement and barricade shoots. After the live-fire ranges, the soldiers of C Coy got to learn the fundamentals of CQC. Following this, Ex URBAN COWBOY transitioned to 2-4 man entry drills within a kill house that was built by C Coy in their new LAV Barn. Ex URBAN COWBOY concluded with a walk through of a complex urban area and a culminating scenario to test the skills they had trained on throughout the exercise.

With the growing excitement of the Winter Holiday Season, C Coy looked back on all the training conducted in the previous year. The year saw many challenges for the troops of C Coy, but through hard work, creativity and a patrolling spirit, no challenge proved too great.



### **Combat Support Company**

The year kicked off for Combat Support Company with Ex FRIGID KAPYONG 22 in January, consisting primarily of theoretical and practical winter warfare training run by each platoon, as well as Light Over Snow Vehicle courses run by Signals Platoon. Reconnaissance Platoon also used this opportunity to practice urban operations drills with new members of the Platoon and members of Bravo Company. Ex FRIGID KAYPONG was followed by a cycle of training courses in February and March, which included Driver and Remote Weapon System Operator courses for the Tactical Armoured Patrol Vehicle, both run by Reconnaissance Platoon with the assistance of instructors from Signals Platoon (who also ran a serial of the Armoured Vehicle Crew Commander course). Concurrently, those members of the Company slated to deploy on Op REASSURANCE (including many candidates and instructors on the training courses) were occupied with attending briefings, appointments, and other activities required in order to deploy.

Ex KAPYONG RAMPART in April and May encapsulated the majority of the work-up training for the rifle company deploying on Op REASSURANCE. This saw the bulk of Combat Support Company employed on the exercise, with Signals Platoon operating the Command Post and ensuring that communications were maintained at all times. Field Support and Training (FST) assisted in bracing and strapping equipment into C-Cans to be shipped overseas for the deployment, while also constructing targetry for the ranges. Reconnaissance Platoon developed the enemy objectives on the live fire ranges before handing them over to the primary training audience, while the Snipers ran a live range for pairs and sections for deploying Combat Support Company and Headquarters personnel. Ex KAPYONG RAMPART culminated with platoon and combat team live fire ranges by day and night, in which personnel from across Combat Support Company participated as range safety staff.

With Ex KAPYONG RAMPART concluded, those deploying on Op REASURANCE began their pre-deployment leave, which coincided with the reorganization of 2 PPCLI of those who remained behind as the rear party, or Home Team, for the deployment. This saw Combat Support Company combined with Administration Company into a Headquarters Company, while the deploying 2 PPCLI Battle Group retained a stand-alone Combat Support company, which deployed on Op REASSURANCE over the first two weeks of June. Notwithstanding this, Combat Support elements in the rear party remained busy into the months of June and July, with Reconnaissance Platoon running a Patrol Pathfinder pre-course for the unit's candidates, Signals Platoon running another serial of the Armoured Vehicle Crew Commander course, and the Snipers running a Basic Sniper pre-course.

After the conclusion of summer leave in August, 2 PPCLI launched into the summer training exercise, Ex KAPYONG ARTEMIS, which culminated with a deployment to the Cygnet Lake area near Minaki, Ontario, for watermanship, navigation and rappel training. Signals Platoon deployed to operate the command post for the duration of the deployment, providing communications support, as well as directly participating in the training activities. Concurrently, Recce Platoon was engaged with executing an Advanced Reconnaissance Patroller pre-course for the unit's candidates, as well as participating in public outreach activities at the Minnedosa Fun Fest, while FST donated a United Nations check point stand that had been stored at 2 PPCLI to the base museum.

Meanwhile on Op REASSURANCE, a detachment from 2 PPCLI Battle Group's infantry Recce Section participated in the Latvian National Guard Patrol Competition, finishing in fourth place. The Sniper group sent two teams to the Tactical Sniper competition in Latvia, and one team to Lithuania for Sniper Fest and Sniper Rendezvous, finishing in second place in the latter. During these competitions, they performed team stalks, shooting by day and night, loophole shooting, helicopter and boat shoots and moving target shooting. Signals elements practiced communications integration with coalition nations and using tactical satellite communications.

After the conclusion of Ex KAPYONG ARTEMIS in early September, the Battalion began preparation for Ex KAPYONG SPADE in the fall. Responsibility for planning and executing the live fire section and platoon level ranges fell to Headquarters Company, with Recce Platoon specifically tasked with the section level range, and Signals Platoon once again manning the exercise command post. Concurrently, Signals Platoon hosted a team of specialists from Edmonton who conducted an upgrade on the communications suite of all the Tactical Armoured Patrol Vehicles in the unit, gaining valuable knowledge and training from their guests in the process. FST was tasked to make commemorative plaques to be given as gifts to the other coalition nations on deployment with 2 PPCLI on Op REASSURANCE. On September 9th, 2 PPCLI commemorated the Battle of the Medak Pocket with the annual Medak Golf Open, organised by Sgt Damon Morris of Signals Platoon.

On deployment, Combat Support Company elements went to the field over the course of late September for multiple training exercises, including Ex RAMPART FORGE, Ex RAMPART STRIKE, Ex RAMPART SHIELD, and Ex SILVER ARROW. Working closely with armoured Recce and artillery assets, 2 PPCLI's infantry Recce section developed new standard operating procedures for locating and harassing enemy forces, successfully demonstrating their efficacy through training scenarios. The Sniper group practiced building sustained rural hides, located key enemy rear elements, provided early warning for the Battle Group, and conducted long range self-sustained patrolling. The Snipers also incorporated other nations into their composition during exercises, implementing multi-national standard operating procedures of their own. The Signallers participated in live ranges and practiced evading enemy detection during field exercises.

As the year draws to a close, members of 2 PPCLI Combat Support Company overseas look forward to the conclusion of a successful deployment and some well-earned rest and relaxation, while Combat Support elements on the Home Team similarly anticipate the upcoming "Silly Season" prior to Christmas, before 2 PPCLI Combat Support Company in Shilo is stood up once again in the New Year, ready for whatever tasks the future holds in store.

### **Administration Company**

2022 was a busy year for 2 PPCLI's Administration Company (Admin Coy). The year began with the company supporting many activities including Ex UNIFIED RESOLVE, annual PCF courses, and critical sub-unit gateway training and TMST. Spring 22 saw Admin Coy split into Home and Away Teams prior to deployment on Op REASSURANCE 22-02. The Away Team (rebranded ROGUE Company) was led by Major John Ross Rudderham and Master Warrant Officer Steven Corcoran and deployed to Latvia in June 22. The Home Team (rebranded Headquarters Company) remained in Shilo and was re-grouped under Major Devin Kruk and Master Warrant Officer Marty Cooke.

The Away Team.

Health Services Support's (HSS) mission was to ensure the provision of agile and responsive health care delivery anywhere, anytime. The addition of Sending Nation (SN)medical assets from NATO partners added challenges for the deployed Role-1, who were augmented with medical teams from Spain, Czechia, Denmark, and Latvia. The greatest challenge for the HSS team was finding solutions to overcome national caveats associated with providing casualty care in such a MN environment. With the welfare of the wounded always the priority, it was agreed upon that emergency casualty care was to be provided by the closest SN medical asset, until a safe hand-over to the applicable national medical assets could be effected. This vital cross training was put to the test on Ex SILVER ARROW, where the deployed MN Role-1 rose to the occasion and efficiently coordinated and tracked over 100 simulated and real-time casualties. The MN HSS team attached to ROGUE Coy surpassed expectations and established a new framework to build on for future deployments.





MN Transport Platoon (Tn Pl) was composed of 18 Regular (Reg) and Primary Reserve (PRes) Force soldiers from across Western Canada. When deployed to the field, Tn Pl grew with the addition of numerous SN attachments from the Spanish, Italian, Polish, Slovak, Albanian and Czech contingents. MN Tn Pl's raison d'etre was to provide timely sustainment for theBattle Group's (BG) nine sub-units; tasks which included the establishment of a 24-hour tactical resupply cycle, delivery and pre-positioning of defensive/engineer stores for trench/obstacle building and the movement of personnel and equipment throughout the complex battle space. MN Tn Pl's biggest challenge was verbal communication with their SN attachments. To mitigate this issue, ROGUE Coy employed SN Liaison Officers in the Coy HQ who were responsible to attend orders, translate information into their native language and pass direction to the SN attachments.

MN Maintenance Platoon (Maint Pl) was composed of 38 Reg and PRes Force soldiers from across Western Canada and was responsible for providing First and Second Line support to all Canadian elements operating on Camp Adazi. When deployed to the field, Maint Pl grew with the addition of SN attachments from the Spanish, Polish and Slovak contingents; reaching a strength averaging 60 soldiers. With these additions, MN Maint Pl was able to provide continuous recovery and repair support to all nine sub-units within the BG. To achieve this they developed simple TTPs and close liaison between leaders at all levels took place before any recovery effort was undertaken. As a result, the Pl grew increasingly capable of working in abstract conditions and around foreign equipment. By the time the Pl deployed on Ex SILVER ARROW it was common to have two or three different SN technicians working together on a recovery task; preserving the BG's momentum.

Supply Platoon (Sup Pl) was composed of 10 Reg Force soldiers who worked tirelessly to support the BG throughout the deployment; regularly punching above their weight given their diminutive size. Their main challenge was a condensed window in which to become familiar with the supply request procedures for all of the SN contingents prior to the commencement of vital BG integration training. Sup Pl were a flexible organization that seamlessly adjusted their methods to align with the national caveats of the different SN contingent and their efforts safeguarded the ability of the BG to train as a single cohesive entity.

A common theme throughout the deployment was the challenge presented by language barriers across the SN contingents. Despite these obstacles, ROGUE Coy served as proof that it is possible to take soldiers from numerous allied nations and integrate them into a highly efficient and cohesive force; a testament to the professionalism of the soldiers NATO has committed to their deterrence mission in Latvia.






#### Home Team.

Supply Platoon (Sub pl) at 2 PPCLI consisted of Supply, Food, Finance, and Ammunition Sections, which supported 2 PPCLI on various exercises and activities throughout the year. Sup Pl's challenges included a reduced roster to execute support to annual training and the Bn's operational readiness requirement. Regardless, they supported Reservist Augmentation from across Canada, organizing specialty courses for those that would deploy on Op REASSURANCE 22-02. After the deployment of personnel, Sup Pl focused their attention on supporting adventure training in Minaki, ON during Ex KAPYONG ARTEMIS. Finance Sect was most affected by the reduced roster, but still ensured all members received members were well supported at all times. Even with a reduced roster, Sup Pl was able to complete all assigned tasks and support the Bn's operational and training objectives throughout the year.

2 PPCLI Maintenace Platoon (Maint pl) was responsible for the repair and recovery of the Bn's fighting and support vehicle fleets. The main focus of the Pl was the lowering of the vehicle off road rate to support 2 PPCLI training. The Home Team Maint Pl members continued to support the Bn during activities, courses and adventure training in Minaki, Ontario despite a reduced strength. Throughout all courses and exercises, Maint Pl conducted countless repairs on various makes/models of military equipment and executed several vehicle extractions from the Shilo Training Area. Even with a reduced roster, all training gateways were achieved and personnel are looking forward to the challenges the New Year brings.

# 3 PPCLI

## Alpha (Parachute) Company

3 PPCLI's A Company began 2022 with a sub-unit tactical parachute insertion exercise onto DROP ZONE BUXTON, followed by dispersed platoon deliberate attacks on respective Platoon objectives. This training proved to be an essential learning opportunity for all soldiers and leaders as the Company prepared for a validation exercise in the early spring at Canadian Forces Base Wainwright. In March, the Battalion deployed on Ex APOLLO VALIDATION. Non-commissioned officers and junior officers of the Company delivered training on light infantry patrolling to prepare the junior soldiers of the Company. Throughout the exercise, the Company completed both live fire and platoon foundation training.

In early April, 3 PPCLI was ordered to force generate a Very High Readiness (VHR) Company for Task Force Poland in order to aid the Polish Territorial Defence Force (TDF) in Humanitarian Assistance operations. Soldiers were drawn from across the Battalion, including from A Company, to deploy under C Company leadership as the VHR Company. In response to the growing refugee crisis in Poland, the VHR Company worked within Task Force Poland to coordinate humanitarian assistance with the Polish Armed Forces, the Polish TDF, Other Government Departments (OGDs) and allies. The Company's soldiers ensured positive control of refugees' essential travel documents including visa applications, maintained security and order within reception centres, and interacted daily with the refugees with care and empathy. The Company was noted for their work ethic and commitment towards the welfare of the refugees during the deployment. The Company redeployed in July 2022.

3 PPCLI continued to produce highly trained paratroopers on behalf of the 1 CMBG Parachute Company Group (PCG) for potential international and domestic operations. Parachute Instructors of A Company dedicated time and effort to pre-course training, ensuring success on various parachute courses, enhancing the airborne insertion capabilities of the 1 CMBG PCG. A Company balanced its mandate of delivering airborne proficiencies with core infantry training by conducting a Basic Parachutist course concurrent to deploying a composite platoon on the Battalion Fall exercise attached to C Company. The force on force training conducted during the Ex APOLLO MIGHT allowed junior leaders to exercise flexibility and initiative, constituting a great learning opportunity.

As the war in Ukraine persisted through the summer, 3 PPCLI force generated two training teams to deploy to the United Kingdom. In early August 2022, 3 PPCLI soldiers deployed on short notice to train soldiers of the Armed Forces of Ukraine, increasing Ukraine's capability to resist the invasion of Russian Forces. Soldiers were again drawn from across the Battalion, including from A Company, to support B Company on the operational task. As part of the Training Delivery Unit, soldiers of 3 PPCLI trained a total of four serials of Ukrainian soldiers through a five-week training program. The training consisted of basic field craft, patrolling skills, trench warfare, offensive and defensive operations, and rural and urban operations. The demanding work was conducted by day and by night, developing Ukrainian soldiers' individual survivability, lethality, and effectiveness; enhancing their combat effectiveness against the Russian invasion.

After a month of garrison routine, soldiers of A Company participated in two international training events: Menton Week at Joint Base Lewis-McChord in Washington, US and Operation Toy Drop, a charity event held before Christmas at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, US.Op Toy Drop provided opportunities for junior parachute instructors and jumpmasters to dispatch foreign airborne soldiers, and mentor other paratroopers on Canadian airborne capabilities, specifically 1 CMBG PCG's capabilities. These soldiers integrated with partner forces and strengthened interoperability with other airborne units. During Menton Week, along with the parachuting events, select soldiers also participated in a gruelling 20-kilometer patrolling competition, all in honour of the legacy of the First Special Service Force. The event provided a great opportunity for soldiers of A Company to interact with service members from the United States and United Kingdom.

Throughout the year, A Company soldiers deployed on two short-notice operations and major international exercises, representing 3 PPCLI's ability to respond to dynamic operational environments. In the New Year, A Company will shift its focus on conducting sub-unit foundation training in order to prepare for deployment to Joint Pacific Multi-national Readiness Centre, in Alaska, US, where our soldiers will be tested alongside Allied forces against the challenges of operating in an extreme cold weather environment.

### **Bravo (Mountain) Company**

In January 2022, B Company developed individual soldier skills by conducting multiple ranges in Edmonton to prepare for Ex APOLLO VALIDATION. This Battalion level exercise was conducted in Wainwright, AB and validated 3 PPCLI soldiers on various individual and crew-served weapons. The exercise also validated platoon leadership on their ability to lead a platoon in the offense. Following this exercise B Company returned to Edmonton to continue with company level training.

During 2022 soldiers of B Company successfully completed various infantry courses including Dismounted TOW Detachment Member, Basic Assault Pioneer and Basic Reconnaissance Patroller. B Company also continued to develop its mountain capability by completing two specific courses. The Complex Terrain Leader course trained candidates how to brief commanders on troop movements across complex terrain, and honed candidates' individual complex terrain movement skills. B Company also conducted a Basic Mountain Operations course which trained candidates from within the Company and other sub-units of the Battalion. In Nordegg AB, candidates were trained and assessed for three weeks on tying various knots, rock climbing, rappelling, and assisting Complex Terrain Leaders on the construction of installations on mountainous terrain.

Upon completion of the Basic Mountain Operations course, B Company was ready for summer leave. However, the well-earned rest was short lived for the soldiers. During summer leave, the Company was deployed on short notice to the United Kingdom (UK) as a part of Op UNIFIER under the British-led Op INTERFLEX. This was the resumption of Op UNIFIER in the UK following its temporary pause due to the Russian invasion of Ukraine earlier in the year. The operation saw B Company deliver highly impactful training to the Armed Forces of Ukraine. The training delivered to the Ukrainian soldiers was modeled after a basic infantry course and provided recruits enhanced foundational skills on how to survive, fight and ultimately succeed on the battlefield. Due to the nature of the deployment, many soldiers of B Company found themselves working well above their current rank. The necessity to deliver daily training to Ukrainian trainees saw even the most junior soldiers of the Company step up and provide quality instruction and mentorship. The training provided during Op UNIFIER was incredibly effective, and the recruits trained by Canadians were some of the best to leave the UK. B Company will remain committed to Op UNIFIER into 2023 following some well-deserved rest during the 2022 holiday season.

### **Charlie Company**

C Company follows the tenants of Adaptive Dispersed Operations and puts special emphasis on patrolling and infiltration. This philosophy increases the likelihood of successful approaches to targets, and maximizes surprise and shock action on the objective. This approach however requires a much greater effort from every soldier. This focus on decentralized command gives far more responsibility to every individual to completely comprehend the task. Being isolated from the main body, each solider inherently has greater scope and responsibility in their decision-making, and can have a disproportionate impact on the overall mission. With fewer individuals around them, soldiers rely more heavily on each other and must be more competent in every aspect of soldiering.

The Company's first exercise of 2022 was Ex APOLLO VALIDATION, a Battalion exercisethat culminated in platoon live fire attacks conducted by day and night. This allowed leadership from the Section Second in Command to the Platoon Commander to enhance their leadership in the field under demanding conditions. Following the Battalion exercise, C Company deployed to Warsaw, Polandas part of Op REASSURANCE. During Op REASSURANCE, C Company assisted the Polish government with security for humanitarian centers, immigration centers, and presence patrols. This operation saw cooperation with members from the American 82nd Airborne Division. Op REASSURANCE was a great opportunity for members to learn about Allied nations' military organization, weapon capabilities, and experience joint activities. C Company's deployment to Poland was very successful and their performance was well regarded by allied nations.


On returning from Poland and from summer leave, C Company began conducting low level training focused on developing platoon standard operating procedures as well as ensuring weapon proficiencies were met. C Company was put on high readiness for natural disasters in Canada, but was never called upon to act. In the Fall C Company participated in the Battalion exercise, Ex APOLLO MIGHT, which culminated in a 25-hour force on force exercise with a platoon from Alpha Company acting as the Opposing Force. The final training that C Company participated in this year wasurban operations under the guidance of urban operations instructors from within the Battalion. The training progressed from theory in the classroom through dry drills toforce on force training using simulated ammunition. The scope of the training was to familiarize C Company troops with the tactics, techniques, and procedures needed to be effective in an urban environment.

Throughout the past year, C Company's soldiers demonstrated hard work, professionalism, and determination during domestic and international tasks. C Company soldiers will continue to develop their skills in 2023 as the Company moves into the build phase with the rest of the Battalion.

### **Combat Support Company**

Combat Support Company spent the past year enabling the Battalion to achieve its operational and training objectives. The majority of the Company deployed on short notice to support operations in Eastern Europe as part of Canada's response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine. At home, Combat Support Company played a key role in supporting force generation both on Battalion exercises and through the conduct of specialty courses. The Company participated in both Ex APOLLO VALIDATION and Ex APOLLO MIGHT in which soldiers conducted live-fire training up to the platoon level. Each of the Company's platoons were able to continue supporting the Battalion despite many of their personnel being deployed on operations.

#### Signals Platoon

Signals Platoon had a busy year conducting training and providing soldiers for various deployments. The Platoon provided signals support during both Ex APOLLO VALIDATION and Ex APOLLO MIGHT. In addition, the Signallers participated in a Canada-wide exercise in which they used high frequency radios to communicate with units in Nanaimo BC, Vancouver BC, Valcartier QC, and Gagetown NB. Signals Platoon provided several radio operators to support the computer-based Brigade exercise, Ex VIGILANT RAM, in which 1 PPCLI was validated for Op REASSURANCE in Latvia. Signals Platoon has also been busy conducting professional development sessions to facilitate the roll out of the CAF's new radio system, the PR-163. Finally, Signals Platoonhad a number of soldiers earn their parachutist's wings on the most recent serial of the Basic Parachute Course conducted at 3 PPCLI. Signals Platoon is staying motivated and ready to support the Battalion's shift to the build phase next year.

#### **Direct Fire Support Platoon**

Direct Fire Support (DFS) Platoon supported the Battalion on both live fire exercises. DFS Platoon provided flanking fire support for Ex APOLLO MIGHT level three ranges using the C16 Automatic Grenade Launcher System and the .50 Caliber Heaving Machine Gun.Flanking fire is used during live training to accustom troops to the sounds that may be present on the modern battlefield, supporting battlefield inoculation. DFS Platoon also deployed several soldiers to the United Kingdom to train the Armed Forces of Ukraine on heavy weapon systems as part of Op UNIFIER.

#### **Intelligence Section**

The Intelligence Section spent the year providing intelligence support to the Battalion through weekly briefs on global crisis spots such as Lebanon, Iran, and Ukraine. In addition, the Intelligence Section provided information briefings on specific topics including rebel groups in Central Africa, China's growing global influence, and threat tactics in the Russo-Ukraine War. The Intelligence Section also provided simulated intelligence reports to support the Battalion on Ex APOLLO VALIDATION and Ex APOLLO MIGHT. The Intelligence section has a unique role within the Battalion as they are responsible for gathering and disseminating information that influences the Battalion's plan. The Intelligence Section is prepared to spend the next year providing the Battalion with accurate and timely intelligence updates to support training.



### **Assault Pioneer Platoon**

The Assault Pioneer Platoon spent the year developing their ability to provide mobility, counter-mobility, and survivability to 3 PPCLI. The Platoon conducted several live exercises including its first independent demolition range in which soldiers practiced using explosives to breach obstacles. Furthermore, the Platoon ran their second in-house Basic Assault Pioneer course which incorporated a greater focus on urban operations and rappelling. The Basic Assault Pioneer course is designed to teach students the basic pioneer tasks which include mobility, counter-mobility, and survivability in support of both light and mechanized forces. Pioneer Platoon conducted Ex URBAN PIONEER which is their annual urban operation refresher. BCompany supported the exercise acting as the Opposing Force (OPFOR) and friendly forces. The exercise culminated in a level three force on force in the advanced urban operation training site. Pioneer Platoon also supported urban operations training by building a modular glass house that can be set up indoors or outdoors to aid in training room clearing drills. The majority of Pioneer Platoon is currently deployed on Op UNIFIER and is playing a key role in training Armed Forces of Ukraine soldiers in their resistance against Russian aggression in Eastern Europe.

### Reconnaissance Platoon

Reconnaissance Platoon spent the last year deploying soldiers on operations and conducting low level training. The Platoon supported both Ex APOLLO VALIDATION and Ex APOLLO MIGHT by providing reconnaissance and surveillance support to the Battalion and its rifle companies. The Platoon also conducted a Basic Reconnaissance Patroller course to continue to generate recce qualified soldiers within the Brigade. In addition, Reconnaissance Platoon provided soldiers with pre-course training to prepare them for the Advance Reconnaissance Patrollercourse that was conducted in the fall of this year in Gagetown, New Brunswick. Reconnaissance Platoon is looking forward to finding new ways to support the Battalion's primary combat function requirements in the new year.

## Sniper Platoon

Sniper Platoon had an eventful year conducting low-level training and preparing to send soldiers on the United States Marine Corps Mountain Scout Sniper Course. The Platoon played a key role in supporting the Battalion's Information, Surveillance, Target Acquisition, and Reconnaissance plan on Ex APOLLO VALIDATION and Ex APOLLO MIGHT. In addition, Sniper Platoon provided basic marksmanship training to the soldiers of Charlie Company in an effort tosharpen their solider skills. Sniper Platoon supported a Basic Sniper Course ran in Dundurn, Saskatchewan in which eight soldiers were successful. Finally, the platoon is preparing to send two soldiers on the United States Marine Corps Mountain Scout Sniper Course in Bridgeport, California. The course teaches snipers advanced high-angle shooting skills necessary for operating in a mountain environment. Sniper Platoon also sent two soldiers on a two week exercise in Chatter Creek, British Columbia. The exercise drew snipers from all three light infantry battalions in the CAF as well as snipers from the Canadian Special Operations Command to practice high angle shooting in a mountain environment. Sniper Platoon is preparing for another high-tempo year of supporting the Battalion.

### Mortar Platoon

The Mortar Platoon spent the year building their capability within the Battalion. On Ex APOLLO VALIDATION, Mortar Platoon fired live for the first time since being reintegrated into the Battalion in 2020. The return of the 81mm mortars to the Infantry Corps is significant because it provides the Battalion with integral fire support necessary for the conventional battle space. Mortar Platoon sent several soldiers to support the Intermediate and Advanced Mortar courses which will help further develop the capability within the Infantry Corps. In addition, Mortar Platoon sent soldiers to CFB Wainwright to train new recruits on Infantry Developmental Phase 1. Mortar Platoon is focussed on expanding their ability to provide indirect fire support to the Battalion in the new year.

# **Administration Company**

Administration Company (Admin Coy), Third Battalion, PPCLI stayed busy supporting the Battalion throughout the year. The spring saw Admin Coy support the Battalion's Ex APOLLO VALIDATION, and throughout 2022 Admin Coy contributed to the Immediate Reaction Unit (IRU), which is a force that can respond to domestic requests for aid in the event of a natural disaster. Admin Coy also supported the deployment of 3 PPCLI soldiers to the United Kingdom (Op UNIFIER), Eastern Europe (Op REASSURANCE), and the Middle East (Op IMPACT). For all of these operations the Battalion counted on Admin Coy and the Battalion Orderly Room (Bn OR) to ensure that its soldiers had the required equipment and administrative support to conduct their missions overseas. In October, Admin Coy supported the Battalion as it deployed to Wainwright, AB for the culminating training event of the year, Ex APOLLO MIGHT. Duringthis exercise, Admin Coy demonstrated its ability to provide logistical support to the Battalion, and specifically exercised its ability to provide service support in austere environments.

Transport Platoon was hard at work this year managing the Battalion's vehicle fleet and conducting a number of driver training courses. Drivers were qualified in the operation of a variety of vehicles. These courses included Military Polaris RZR, Air Brakes, Medium Support Vehicle System Standard Military Pattern, among others. Transport Platoon supported the Battalion during their road moves to and from Wainwright, AB for Ex APOLLO VALIDATION and Ex APOLLO MIGHT. Some members of Transport Platoon had the opportunity to deploy overseas for as part of Op REASURANCE and Op UNIFIER. Throughout the year Transport Platoon worked diligently to ensure the Battalion's vehicle fleet was ready when called upon.

Maintenance Platoon worked tirelessly to ensure that the Battalion's weapons and vehicles were serviceable and available when they were needed. This past year has been a very unique year for the Regiment. Obviously, the Regiment surfaced from of the Provincial / Territorial and Federal Covid restrictions, allowing a return to in-person parading. With 3rd Canadian Division tasked as the Army's lead on international operational deployments, several members of the Regiment found themselves on tours in Kuwait, Iraq, Lebanon, and Latvia. In May 2022, 25 members were invited to join 39 CBG in their joint (Navy / Army / Air Force) exercise in the waters off of Comox, BC. Focusing on the requirement to rebuild the Regiment following Covid, the L EDMN R conducted a BMQ course, a DP 1 Infantry course and supported with instructors and students on the Army's leadership courses during the Reserve Summer Training season. Looking towards the coming year (2023), the Army has prioritized the need to grow our numbers and attain maximum Trained Effective Strength by March 2024.

With this in mind, the Regiment will operate on four lines of operations. First - the necessary support to Attractions and Recruitment (both at the Home Station and C Company – Yellow Knife). Second – grow the Regiment's junior leaders (Cpl / MCpl / Sgt and 2Lt / Lts). Third – prepare for potential Domestic Operations as the Bn HQ and one of the Companies within 41 CBG's TBG. Fourth – (and equally important) focus on 'retention' through several section / platoon level collective Dry and Live Fire exercises to keep those members of the Regiment 'engaged' that are not fully involved with the previous three levels of operations. The Regiment remains healthy (despite our decrease in numbers, with much being attributed to normal attrition and the reduced recruiting during Covid). The current state of the Regiment is a direct result of the efforts, dedication and ingenuity of the senior NCOs and officers who excel the Regiment within the Brigade. Equally important are the 'supporting fires' from the Regiments Honouraries (both serving and retired), the commitment and engagement of the LER Association and the LER Museum who strive to keep the serving component tied to their Regiments proud history.

2022 was certainly a challenging year for the Regiment. We faced, head on, many unique issues such as Covid restrictions, unprecedented attrition, retention, recruiting, and NCO shortages. We conducted collective training such as field firing and patrolling exercises in order to maintain our state of readiness, excite and engage the soldiers, and also create new leaders and prepare them for their leadership courses. We ran courses such as BMQ and DP1 Infantry that filled the ranks with badly needed new Infanteers. The Regiment also participated in the celebration of life for Cpl (R) Maurice White, a very well known and loved WW2 veteran who served with both the Eddies and the First Special Service Force. In July, the Regiment was rocked by the sudden death of Sgt Brian Harvey, 2IC of the Mortar Platoon. Brian was a popular and very capable SNCO who was loved by all who knew him. His grieving brothers and sisters pulled together and proudly conducted a military funeral, reflective of the soldier, leader, and great man that he was. In September, The Canadian Armed Forces also lost our Commander in Chief, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The Reg't held our own memorial parade to pay respects and acknowledge the Queen's outstanding life of service, and then welcomed in the happy news of the proclamation of His Majesty, King Charles III, King of Canada.

The past year was truly one full of adversity and challenges for the Regiment, but despite all of this, we came through the other side stronger than ever! Not only has the Loyal Edmonton Regiment remained a viable unit within 41 Canadian Brigade Group, but we have also remained a "Go To" unit within the Brigade that gets things done.



Captain Cordell Friesen managed millions of dollars in order to support running the Junior Canadian Ranger program out of Yellowknife, and Capt Jake Taylor oversaw the patrolling matrix and budget of the Canadian Rangers, while subsequently patrolling to Yukon and acting as the Op NANOOK-NUNAKPUT Liaison Officer.









## The Rifles

At the beginning of 2022 The Rifles envisaged a calm operational cycle, allowing the battalions to catch up on much needed training and prepare for upcoming tours. That all changed when Russia's 'special operation' in Ukraine commenced in February, and because of it Operation INTERFLEX was conceived and became the lead defence contribution to the Armed Forces of Ukraine (AFU).

A direct result of the invasion saw RIFLES battalions being either deployed to NATO regions or delivering an infantry training package in the UK to prepare Ukrainian soldiers for fighting on their frontline. Tours were either shortened or scrapped altogether, but with typical RIFLES dash many of our Riflemen stepped up and contributed to what was arguably the most significant training package of the year. Operation INTERFLEX soon became the buzzword across the Regiment and saw two of our Regular Battalions tasked in the vanguard, with 3 RIFLES based in Cumbria and 5 RIFLES in Wiltshire.

Across 6-months, using a 5-week training cycle, Ukrainian civilians were taught a basic infantry package but what began as a three-week sprint to train them eventually became a more sustainable five-week programme after identifying gaps in the cycle. The package was essentially a version of the Reserves' basic infantry course, whittled down to only what is necessary for increasing survivability and lethality, whilst being shaped to the specific requirements of those fighting the war in Ukraine.

The planning was conducted at command level, but the delivery came from the JNCOs who did an outstanding job. In the long run it has provided us with a unique opportunity to learn how a primary adversary is fighting. Despite Operation INTERFLEX other commitments needed to be completed and these saw 1RIFLES provide support on the high-profile Commonwealth Games through Operation UNITY. 2 RIFLES deployed B Company to Jordan on Exercise OLIVE GROVE and ran a JNCO Cadre for Riflemen across the regiment, including specialist roles for Fire Support Company. At short notice and not long after the battalion's return from training in Kenya, 2 RIFLES were deployed to Estonia on Operation CABRIT and contributed to Operations VIGILANT FOX, CASARIA, THORN, STIFFTAIL and Exercise SILVER ARROW – all mainly in Scandinavia and the Baltic States.

Despite 3 RIFLES' commitment to Operation INTERFLEX, it also found time to live fire on Exercise VAN-GUARD BUGLE and run Exercise MORTARS BLITZ in north Scotland at Cape Wrath. Meanwhile, 4RANGERS contributed to the UK's response to the invasion of Ukraine and had multiple deployments across the Middle East, including Lebanon and Jordan. The battalion also built on our excellent relationship with the US Green Berets, who they routinely deploy and train alongside.

Combined with 5 RIFLES' work with Operation INTERFLEX, the battalion also found time to deploy on exercises in Finland, Poland and Canada, the latter being short toured so that they could return to work with the Ukrainian Forces. Additionally, they also entered two teams into the Cambrian Patrol Competition; winning gold and silver medals.

Our reserve battalions also stepped up, providing troops for Operations TOSCA, UNITY and INTERFLEX; as well as sending Riflemen to the Falkland Islands, Cyprus, Nepal and Somalia. 7 RIFLES went to North America on Exercise NORTHERN STRIKE, working with the US National Guard in advance of the Brigade all-reserve Exercise SPEARPOINT.



Our Riflemen pushed themselves hard as individual and team sportsmen. Our elite athletes continue to excel in Brazilian Jiu Jitsu, Bobsleigh, Skeet Shooting and Rugby(league and union) winning competitions and representing the Army and national teams at major events. RIFLES's teams won trophies in rugby, football, swimming, power lifting, boxing and cycling – to name just a few. But also competed in many other sports including golf, netball and athletics; with some outstanding personal achievements. 5 RIFLES came third in the Regular Army Operational Shooting Competition at Bisley(with two Riflemen coming second and third) and 7 RIFLES became the first RIFLES team to win the Reserve Bisley Competition.

We also stepped up the pace ensuring our Riflemen were exposed to the maximum amount of adventure training possible. A 14-person team climbed Mt Kenya, some sailed off the coast of Mombasa in Kenya, while others managed to complete either mountain biking or canoeing courses or Adventure Training packages. We skied in France on Exercise FROSTED BLADE and in Canada spent time in the Rockies climbing, canoeing and walking.

During 2022 Operation INTERFLEX became the main effort for many Riflemen, and it allowed the Regiment to make a direct contribution to European security in a very rewarding way. The Riflemen worked incredibly hard to support our Ukrainian partners and they found the task hugely fulfilling. Our Junior NCOs excelled, and we are seeing positive results on the battlefields in Ukraine.

The Regiment is in excellent shape for the coming challenges of 2023. The Battalions are well manned and to date have met the requirements of the Integrated Review, although there is still work to be done. The operation has a clear linkage to 3 RIFLES' future role as a Security Force Assistance Battalion.

In the background, we have been working hard to prepare for future tasks. There are large exercises to look forward to, not least Exercise ORION; a mechanised battalion-size deployment to France in April 2023, where 1 RIFLES will be working within a French armoured brigade. 5 RIFLES is earmarked for Op CABRIT 14 in Spring 24, with a company likely to deploy with the Royal Dragoon Guards on Op CABRIT 15 (Autumn 24).7 RIFLES will lead the next Brigade all-reserve Ex BALTIC FIST in Estonia in Jul 23.

Across the Regiment there has been a focus on improving the quality of life of all its members through sport and adventure training opportunities, alongside excellent training and career development activity. We aim to continue focusing on that throughout the year and into the future.

The Battalion has had an incredibly busy year and has not stopped operationally at home or abroad. After returning from Cyprus on Operation TOSCA, A Company delivered support to the Commonwealth Games through Operation UNITY. The tempo increased for the Kenya deployment, on Exercise ASKARI DELTA, where the Battalion was joined by 70 Reservists and a Platoon from the Royal Gibraltar Regiment.

There have been strong promotion numbers across the junior ranks and of significance, Captain Plunket became Equerry to HM The Queen Consort. The battalion enjoys a wide variety of sports, including Nordic and Downhill skiing as well as surfing. Riflemen participate in 27 individual sports and its elite sportsmen include Lance Corporal Ricky Bellingham, who secured a bronze medal at the world masters Brazilian Jiu Jitsu martial arts, and Rifleman Thomas Harris who has been re-selected to be the Army's elite sports programme in Bobsleigh.

Adventure Training in Cyprus and Kenya saw Riflemen participate across the board and a 14-person team climbed Mt Kenya, whilst others went sailing off Mombasa. Its South-West connection is strong, and buglers remained in high demand, supporting the funeral of HM Queen Elizabeth II and the Regimental Sounding Retreat at Horse Guards. 1 RIFLES also supported Wales University Officer Training Corps' Annual Deployment Exercise, and Canford and Eton Combined Cadet Forces' Summer Training Camps.

## 2 Rifles

The battalion is in excellent shape, primarily after a demanding tour in Estonia on Operation CABRIT. B Company deployed to Jordan for the month long, Exercise OLIVE GROVE, following which many of them visited the ancient city of Petra, the Dead Sea and Wadi Rum, a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. C Company ran a Junior Non-Commissioned Officer Cadre. I Coy and the Signals Platoon ran support weapons and signals cadres and upon completion, and at short notice, the battalion deployed to Estonia on Op CABRIT.

A series of quick succession deployments then took place: C Company moved to Finland on Operation CASARIA, and latterly Exercise VIGILANT FOX.B Company went to Latvia on Exercise SILVER ARROW, whilst A Company deployed to Lithuania on Exercise IRON WOLF. I Company and 88 Battery (Royal Artillery attachment) returned to Finland on Exercise FINLAND SWORD, and troops from 20 Field Squadron (Royal Engineers attachment) went to Poland on Operation STIFFTAIL. 2 RIFLES continues to impress in the boxing ring and the battalion's rugby team remains unbeaten this season, winning the Army Quench Cup at its conclusion. Alongside these achievements, individual athletes competed in netball, karate and British Army Warrior Fitness (BAWF). As for adventurous training, 30% of the Battalion has managed to complete either mountain biking or canoeing.

The families of the battalion have had a packed welfare programme, particularly during Operation CABRIT. The first major event of the year was the Platinum Jubilee Party which over 250 people attended; entertainment and games were laid on for the children while the adults enjoyed sumptuous food provided by the Battalion's talented chefs. Since the start of the deployment to Estonia there was a well-attended programme of coffee mornings and Sunday lunches alongside a spectacular fireworks night.



3 RIFLES is one of NATO's Very High Readiness battalions (Operation AGORA) but still managed to pack out the year with operations and training. The JNCO Cadre in Otterburn saw 62 of 90 Riflemen successfully promote, and alongside it, Fire Support Company ran cadres. However, Operation INTERFLEX became the focus of the year.

Exercise VANGUARD BUGLE saw companies conduct live firing over 5-days from Jackal, Mastiff and Wolfhound vehicles alongside dismounted platoon attacks. This was followed by Operation INTERFLEX where 3 RIFLES trained 2,600 of the 10,000 Ukrainian recruits across 13 courses and 6-months. Over 5-weeks the package covered rural, urban and defensive tactics; including weapon handling, marksmanship, field craft, first aid, mines and explosive devices.

The Mortar Platoon dealt with severe weather conditions in Scotland on Exercise MORTARS BLITZ and A Company prepared for Operation CABRIT, where it will deploy to Estonia as part of the Queen's Royal Hussars Battlegroup as an anti-tank company. Training began in September with live firing at Barry Buddon, and Otterburn in October, for Mastiff live fire gunnery.

Two teams entered the Cambrian Patrols Competition, earning gold and silver medals, and its sports and adventure training programmes were busy. In boxing 3 RIFLES was awarded the Brigade Trophy and in the Army Championships the battalion finished third overall, with three finalists and two victories.

Two Riflemen made the Army Alpine Skiing Team, winning the tri-service championships. The footballers won the Army 6-a-sidecompetition, and the swimming team came second in the Army Major Unit Competition; with 13 members winning medals, many of which were individual golds.



The Battalion has worked hard to develop the Ranger concept and 'License to Operate' in its new and exciting role. In keeping with our RIFLES heritage, it takes great pride to understand, innovate, and experiment with all contributions.

Involvement in large scale combat operations, and training alongside US Special Forces partners in swamps and deserts of California has seen new tactics and technology ruthlessly tested. 2022 saw the delivery of the first large scale unconventional warfare exercise in the UK, Exercise APOLLOS SABRE, the development and delivery of new courses such as language and cultural awareness training, as well as urban combat skills. Individuals have undertaken battlefield studies in Europe and Jordan, identifying leadership lessons and methodology to working in the Arab world.

In its first year 4 RANGERS deployed to over ten countries on operations and training as well as conducting battlefield studies and adventurous training. It contributed to the UK's response to the invasion of Ukraine, had multiple deployments across the Middle East, including Lebanon and Jordan. The key partner remains the US Green Berets, who they routinely deploy and train alongside. Sports participation has increased: Cpl Craggs, one of the battalion's female Rangers, came fourth at the World Powerlifting Championships and received a CGS Commendation. A JNCO was selected for Team GB Taekwondo, and our swimmers were recognised at the Inter Services Awards. The Battalion finished off the year with its first regimental boxing night against the Metropolitan Police.

## 5 Rifles

Riflemen have been abroad on exercises in Finland, Poland and Canada and involved in the training of the Armed Forces of Ukraine on Operation INTERFLEX. Exercise PRAIRIE TORNADO in Canada was challenging because of the armoured fleet's reallocation to the European continent. Consequently, the Battalion was only resourced to deliver subunit level training and dismounted live firing. Despite this, combined arms manoeuvre competency and mounted close combat continued. Involvement was cut short when the battalion recovered back to the UK to start training the Armed Forces of Ukraine (AFU) on Operation INTERFLEX.

5 RIFLES deployed to train 600 Ukrainian citizens, providing them all the skills and experience necessary for the battlefield. Adjustments to the operation and trainings at largely with JNCOs. Royal New Zealand Infantry Regiment troops assisted, with the course looking like a version of the Reserves' Basic Infantry Course, and an emphasis on increasing survivability and lethality. Those not deployed delivered support to other units' training events or making better use of Tregantle Fort. The return of the Army Operational Shooting Competition at Bisleysaw our best results yet, with the team finishing third, with two Riflemen in the top three, and six in the top 25.

In Canada many troops experienced multi-activity adventure training in the Rockies. The footballers excelled and Riflemen competed as individuals and as a unit, in many sports disciplines, including British Army Warrior Fitness and Cycling. Rfn Young remains on the Army Elite Sports Programme and hopes to compete at the next Olympics, and 5 RIFLES has several other members of the battalion representing the Army in a variety of sports. 5 RIFLES continued to support its aligned Associations and Cadets, attended the Wiltshire Cadets VIP Visitor Camp and several school jobs fairs, the 'Turning of the Pages' in Winchester Cathedral, the Lord Lieutenant for Buckinghamshire's Awards and travelled to Arras to lay to rest two WW1 soldiers.



This year 6 RIFLES resubordinated from 7th Light Mechanised Brigade Combat Team to 19th Light Brigade – the Army's new Reserve Brigade. It remains paired with the 1 RIFLES and continues to provide them with augmentees for operations and other activities.

After mobilising in July in advance of Kenya, reservists joined the rest of the battalion on Salisbury Plain for a two-week annual deployment exercise. From there they moved to Birmingham to support the Commonwealth Games and since August were attached to 1 RIFLES whom they deployed on Operation TOSCA with. In addition, the battalion had Riflemen deployed to the Falkland Islands, an officer serving with the United Nations in Somalia, and a non-commissioned officer training Ukrainian soldiers on Salisbury Plain with 5 RIFLES. In total there were also 14 Riflemen at notice to react to civil emergency in the Southwest.

Troops were sent to Dunkirk, Sicily, and Normandy to learn some hard-won lessons on fighting a high-intensity conflict against a peer foe. Finally, 40 members of the Battalion enjoyed an intensive week of on and off-piste skiing in the Austrian Alps and eight of our reservists sailed for a week off the South Coast.

The battalion hosted four successful Bugle Breakfasts and once again helped run the annual Ten Tors event for nearly 3,000 teenagers on Dartmoor. The Salamanca Band performed across the Southwest, at Sounding Retreat on Horse Guards, and at Her late Majesty The Queen's birthday celebrations at the British Embassy in Madrid.

## 7 Rifles

The battalion deployed Riflemen on overseas operations and tasks in Estonia, Cyprus, Nepal, Kenya, and the Falkland Islands and 1st, 2nd, 5th and 6th Battalions with individual augmentees. The Waterloo Band and Bugles contributed personnel to Sounding Retreat at Horse Guards, a repatriation ceremony of a WW1 soldier in Belgium, and the funeral procession for Operation BRIDGE. Riflemen also supported the UK Border Force, the Scottish Ambulance Service and training of the Ukrainian Armed Forces.

Despite a significant turnover in its permanent staff 7 RIFLES is well manned. It continued to support the Army and Combined Cadet Forces, and the Reading Branch of The Rifleman's Association continues to grow under WO1 Rob Soutter.

A Company Group trained and deployed to Michigan, USA for the multinational Exercise NORTHERN STRIKE, and participation in the Brigade all-reserve Exercise SPEARPOINT. One of the highlights of 2022 was the 7 RIFLES shooting team winning the Army Reserve Operational Shooting Competition with all members qualifying for the Army Reserve 50 top shots. The first RIFLES battalion to win the Army Operational Shooting Competition.

The Alpine Ski Team deployed to France for Exercise FROSTED BLADE and 7 RIFLES maintained itsfocus on cricket and golf. Riflemen outperformed in netball, hockey, rugby and athletics.

8 RIFLES continues to grow at pace for a relatively new unit of five years and during the year provided Riflemen to Operation UNITY (Commonwealth Games), the British Army Training Unit Kenya and Exercise ASKARI STORM with 1RIFLES. We led the ARes Homeland Resilience Pilot 1, cohering personnel across several units, on high readiness reserve contracts to provide UK Standby Battalions for fires, floods and other disasters. 8 RIFLES continues to grow in mass and capability. Focus has been on closing the middle management gaps at Corporal, Serjeant and Captain, whilst chasing down our narrowing Rifleman deficit. Birmingham is our number one growth location, but we are also looking at options to maximise our laydown in traditional RIFLES heartlands in the North.

The battalion ran internal sub-unit adventure training packages, and planning continues for Exercise NORTHERN FROSTED SWORD that will see 35 Riflemen and instructors attend a week of downhill skiing. Additionally, CSjt McGinley has represented the Army at angling and LCpl Chatwin has represented The Rifles and Army at mountain biking.

It has been a busy year for activities across our Regimental Pillars. In the last six months 8 RIFLES has been involved in 60 such events (one was Regular, five Reserve, two Cadet, nine Association, 35 Community and eight were 'multi-pillar' focussed) - not including Remembrance events. Its efforts are focused on growing the Battalion and maintaining the RIFLES brand across the communities.

8 RIFLES competed at the Army Reserves Operational Shooting Competition at Bisley and finished sixth of 15 AResunits, with two Riflemen in the Top 50 shots. In October, the Cambrian Patrol Team recorded a bronze medal. E Coy secured top place in both ARes male and mixed categories on 1st Division's Bismarck Challenge – a team relay event.






















# From the bridge too far to the Prairie sky

Col. John Waddy, an English war hero who loved Manitoba, died near his birthplace in Somerset, England in 2020. He was 100 and one of the last surviving airborne officers from the turbulent, tragic Second World War Battle of Arnhem where he was wounded three times. Three-quarters of his battalion were killed, wounded or captured. It remains the central mythological battle of the British Airborne. What is rarely mentioned is Canada's role — three very precise interventions, the second an almost miraculous success. Arnhem made up one-third of the airborne Operation Market Garden — the British third. Undertaken Sept. 17-26, 1944, it was the largest airborne attack ever attempted. The big strategic idea was to leap right over the German front with three massive jumps, each one deeper behind their lines, in order to capture three strategic bridges, the last being Arnhem, 100 kilometres behind German lines in the Netherlands.

Arnhem was the "bridge too far" as Frederick "Boy" Browning, the commanding general of the British Airborne, called it. The ground part of the operation was an equally massive tank charge — like a Guderian style blitzkrieg — racing down a single narrow road, across the bridges in sequence the moment they were captured by the paratroopers. Altogether it was a brilliant, imaginative plan, with remarkable leaders and soldiers. Everywhere there were acts of courage and desperate attempts to alter the destiny they were presented with once they hit the ground.

As John Waddy stood in the open jump door, getting ready, the plane next to them went down in flames. Sixty men in his battalion were dead before they landed. This was not the surprise they had been promised. Once on the ground they knew they had to turn the situation around very fast, as skirmishes quickly turned into increasingly difficult clashes and German tanks began to appear. Waddy was wounded and got evacuated to a field hospital, then to another.

The first, British, was blown up, killing most of the wounded. Waddy was captured and eventually operated on by a German doctor in a small hotel on a billiard table. He was thrown on a pile of dead men, then pulled off it. Death was everywhere.

Yet the battle was far from over. Almost 9,000 paratroopers were trying to get into the battle to break through to the bridge. Among the paratroopers were some 30 Canadian lieutenants and captains lent to the British, who were short of officers. They commanded platoons. Only three were rescued. The rest were killed, wounded or captured. Much has been said by the British paratroopers about the toughness and courage of those young Canadians.

A 24-year-old lieutenant, John Wellbelove from Eston, Sask., is often evoked as a hero. His platoon was overrun by four tanks and a large group of German soldiers. He was last heard taunting the attackers as he fired his Sten gun, rallying his men in a helpless cause.

The 9,000 fought every way they could, taking enormous casualties. It couldn't be done. The overall situation was bleak. Ten thousand men had parachuted or glided in Sept. 17-18. About 2,400 came out, rescued on the night of Sept. 26-27, almost entirely by the 23rd Field Company of the Canadian Engineers. The miraculous Canadian intervention.

This small group of engineers had first to make their way through German positions to a kilometre from the river, then drag their 20-foot storm boats under terrible conditions, over two steep flood walls to the banks of the Lower Rhine. In fact, there were four engineering companies there to do the job. But it turned out the 20th Canadian Engineers were badly placed to play a major role. And the two British companies had much smaller boats powered only by oars — useless for crossing a raging river.

So, the 23rd, and their 14 fragile boats, equipped with highly temperamental 50- horsepower Evinrude outboard engines — no reverse and no clutch — had to figure out how to cross back and forth over a major river in the pitch black under constant machine gun, mortar and artillery fire, as well cope with a heavy current. Many were sunk. The engines kept dying. So did the soldiers.

Yet almost 2,500 were saved. The engineers had remarkable leaders. Their commander, Maj. Michael Tucker directed it all while exposed to heavy fire. Lt. Russel Kennedy was constantly on the river, organizing, encouraging, himself driving boats across. Sapper Raymond Le Bouthillier led 26 round trips. Sapper David McCready undertook endless crossings until full daylight made them all clear targets. I have often thought that one of their advantages was typical of so many Canadian boys of every background — from eight or so on they were raised driving tin boats with outboards in rough water. There was an instinctual side to it all.

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Waddy's postwar life was inevitably wrapped up in the last days of the British Empire. You would have found him in Palestine — where he was seriously wounded — and in Egypt and Libya. He was also there in the middle of the Malayan Emergency in Malaysia — the first guerrilla campaign won by a mainly western army. He was mentioned in dispatches for his role in that jungle conflict. Then came Jordan and Cyprus. Then Vietnam as an adviser to the British Ambassador.

And all the while Waddy was rising in the British two-part system of outside-the-box warfare — the Parachute Regiment and the Special Air Service (SAS). He set up the Para Battle School and in 1964 became Colonel SAS; that is, the Director of Special Forces, which he modernized.

In 1957 in the midst of all this he went off with his wife Anne for a two-year exchange with the Canadian Airborne School in Rivers Camp, 30 km from Brandon. In the manner of a Russian novel by Lemontov or Tolstoy, there it was — out on the steppes, the great rolling prairies in all their grandeur, an encampment of a few thousand men and their families, flying everything from fighters to transports and jumping out of the sky.

It is hard to explain life at Rivers. Not something most people would know about. During recess we would pile out to see if there was a jump going on, and whether we could identify our fathers in the sky. When a snowstorm removed all visibility and the winds and temperatures were dangerous, big white Bombardier military carriers would appear out of the obscurity to take us to school. No cancelled school days. The soldiers and the children loved the atmosphere of adventure. The wives were stranded and not particularly happy.

As it happened, when John Waddy arrived in Rivers, a Winnipegger, the author's father Lt.-Col. Bill Saul, was commanding the Airborne School. The two men quickly became close friends. My father hadn't become aparatrooper until transferring in the post-war years to the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, freshly converted into a parachute regiment.

During the war he had been a Winnipeg Rifle, first fighting on loan to the British in North Africa, then backwith his regiment landing on the firrst wave at Juno Beach on D-Day, then brieflyy in the Netherlands before he was wounded.

John Waddy seemed to feel completely at home in the relaxed Canadian atmosphere, the mysterious rolling prairies, the extremes of nature. He and his wife Ann seized every free moment to go off camping somewhere, the more isolated the better.



As for Arnhem, the frustration of 1944 was erased in 1945 — on April 13-14 with Operation Anger. Again there is the Canadian link. The city and the area were taken and freed by First Canadian Corps, commanded by Gen. Charles Foulkes. First Canadian Corps was then made up of Canadian and British soldiers. Foulkes gave the Brits the honour of leading the attack on Arnhem. History demanded this.

More precisely, it was quite rightly the mythological property of their Airborne forces. This second battle of Arnhem was not the most dramatic, but nor was it easy. Two days of heavy fighting. Not a battle to be forgotten. And it was the final act of Canada's Arnhem role — the sacrifice of the CANLOAN officers, the miraculous Canadian Engineers rescue, the final victory at Arnhem by First Canadian Corps.

He was carried to his grave and lowered into it by men of the 4th Battalion, the Parachute Regiment, successors of the men with whom he had leapt into the Battle of Arnhem.





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### **RMC** Wall of Honour

In 2009 the RMC class of 1963 gifted a stone wall to the College – an ess-curved structure of about one hundred meters in length and two in height, located immediately east of the Commandant's residence on the College grounds in Kingston. Annually, the College Club selects up to six candidates for recognition on the wall – each candidate, alive or gone, must have a College number and must be known for an incredibly significant contribution to Canada and beyond. In a modest ceremony, the plaques outlining those contributions are uncovered during the annual RMC Club weekend in September each year.





4862 General John de Chastelain was the first Patricia to be so honoured and that was in the second year of the selection process, 2020. His inscription recognizes him as Infantry Officer, RMC Commandant, CDS, celebrated achievement, international peace negotiator, piper.

H2897 Major-General Herb Pitts was honoured this last September 2022, as a Soldier, Leader, Volunteer.

A group of witnesses to the unveiling represented each of the four regiments that Herb had been a part of – LdSH(RC), PPCLI, QOR of C and Cdn AB Regt. COR PPCLI unveiled the plaque on behalf of Herb's family. Additional watchers were Wendy Kennedy, Norah Hewson, Sue Bragdon and Ron Ruiters.

It may appear an oddity that Herb has an H in front of his cadet number – the RMC Club devised this years ago to add further honour to those who also gave exemplary service to the RMC Club of Canada – and Herb was for some years a superb National Club President. Hence the H.

Marianne Pitts, passed away in November, 2022. The family have received images and a memento of the unveiling.

# Memorial Stone for Lady Patricia at Mersham Church

Our second Colonel-in-Chief, Lady Patricia died on 13 June 2017. She was buried in the graveyard of St John the Baptist Church at Mersham, alongside her husband John Knatchbull (7th Baron Brabourne) who had predeceased her. In 2019, the Regiment contacted the 3rd Countess Mountbatten of Burma (Lady Penelope) and another son of our Lady Patricia— the Honourable Michael-John Knatchbull, about a memorial plaque or stone to recognize, in St John the Baptist Church, Mersham, Lady Patricia and her important role with the PPCLI. Both sides were fully supportive. Michael-John and his sister Lady Joanna Knatchbull had already engaged a stone mason and crafted a wording for a stone tablet in the Knatchbull chapel at the Mersham Church (a stone's throw from Lady Patricia's Newhouse in Mersham village) that did recognize Lady Patricia's service. That stone tablet was installed in November 2021, and the pictures here show the wording and how it fits into the Knatchbull wall.

The next workshops will be virtual on 12-14 April 21. Get involved and attend a workshop so that you can help your brothers and sisters. Saving one life makes it worthwhile.

- **4. Education.** In 2020, the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund (HGMF) awarded 17 Student Bursaries for a total of \$21,000. Bursaries are available to serving, released and retired Patricias, including wives, children, and grandchildren. Applications must be submitted by 15 July.
- **5. Support to Veterans and Families.** In 2021 and beyond, the Association will provide financial support to Col Belchner Centre in Calgary, Kipnes Centre for Veterans in Edmonton, and the Veterans Association Food Banks in Calgary and Edmonton to name just a few.
- **6. Cadets.** Our 'Farm Team.' Young people who work hard to perpetuate our Regiment. The Association provides Regimental hatbadges, shoulder flashes and financial support to PPCLI Affiliated Cadet Corps. Cadets will benefit from your mentorship.

- 7. Regimental History and Heritage. Memorials to the fallen are sacred and must be preserved. As everyone knows Patricia Park was vandalized in September 2020. We completed the repairs before Remembrance Day. The HGMF maintains Frezenberg, Lansdowne, Patricia Park, and other Regimental Memorials.
- **8. Regimental Museum.** The Museum preserves our achievements and history. They depend on funding and volunteers. The Association supported the museum's operations and outreach by donating \$10,000 for the Victoria Cross and 60 mm Mortar displays.
- **9. Fundraising.** The Association cannot accomplish the above without money. Every 18 months, the Calgary Branch Casino raises between \$60-80,000. The average return on Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund investments is \$25,000 per year and a further \$8-10,000 is donated by Association members. With more support, we can have an even greater impact.
- 10. Regimental Influence. There are 13 Branches across Canada and each hold a number of social activities based on the desires of their membership. Branches keep the Regimental spirit alive and often assist individuals within their local area. There is no rank in the Association. If a retired or released Pte/Cpl/MCpl, etc.. does not like the way things are going they can voice their opinion and be heard. Get involved in a Branch and help chart the Way Ahead for the Branch and Association. The Association is not just for 'Old Geezers.' It is your Association get involved and steer it towards activities that interest you.

# 2022 Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund Educational Bursary Report

The Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund (HGMF) is named after Brigadier Andrew Hamilton Gault, DSO, ED, CD, Founder of the PPCLI. It is a registered charitable organization that supports the Regiment and the Regimental Family.

In 2022 the HGMF conducted a review of its charitable purposes and activities with a view to better supporting veterans and their families. That review, conducted by our Veterans and Family Support Committee, under the leadership of Donna Campbell, identified several potential new activities. These were subsequently incorporated into a draft set of revised charitable objects and activities that are currently being circulated amongst the Regiment's governing bodies for comment and subsequent submission to the Canadian Revenue Agency Charities Directorate for approval.

The HGMF sponsored three Compassionate Listening Workshops this year. These provide peer support volunteers, including the PPCLI Association Voluntary Patricia volunteers, with an enhanced set of skills to help veterans get the help they need. Those who attended the workshops have found them very beneficial.

The HGMF Board of Trustees decided to reduce the number of student bursaries this year, but to increase their value to acknowledge the increasing cost of post-secondary education. The theme for the naming of the bursaries was the 20th anniversary of the 3rd Battalion's Op APOLLO tour, specifically honouring those who lost their lives in the Tarnak Farm friendly fire incident. A total of \$30,000 in student bursaries was awarded as follows:

We express our thanks to the PPCLI Association for their continued assistance in delivering the student bursary program. A total of \$30,000 has been allocated for the 2023 program. Application details can be found on the HGMF website (hgmf.ca).

Our support to PPCLI affiliated Cadet Corps was limited for the first part of the year because of COVID; however, with restrictions now lifted the cadet corps are parading again and we have initiated the 2022/23 HGMF Cadet Corps Trophy Competition. We are also soliciting 2023 grant applications from the Cadet Corps.



The memorial for Jack Monroe, one of the Originals, was installed this spring. Thank you to Greg Ferguson of the SW Ontario of the PPCLI Association for leading this project and for all those who donated to it.

As reported in last year's edition, the HGMF has also agreed to fund 10% of the estimated \$250,000 refurbishment of the St. Bartholomew's Church Stained Glass Window. There is a very strong Patricia connection with this church, and in particular with this stained-glass window, even though it dates back more than a century. The restoration work has been completed and Don Dalziel reports that it looks amazing. As of writing the HGMF has raised \$21,720 towards this project. A cheque will be delivered for \$20,000 by the end of the year with the remaining \$5,000 being formally presented to the church early in 2023.





Detailed planning continues for the Sydney Frost Battlefield Tour of Sicily and Italy slated for 2024. This will be an outstanding historical tour of PPCLI WWII Italian Campaign battlefield sites. Information will be available in March 2023 on how you can participate in that tour. The HGMF will sponsor the participation of as many cadets as possible, depending on the amount of funds we can raise. The approximate cost per cadet is \$6,000. The HGMF, as a charity, depends on your donations to support our programs. Donations may be made in a variety of ways.
